## ABOUT THE COLLEGE

Government Degree College Ani is a rural institution located in the picturesque surroundings of Haripur, approximately seven kilometers from Ani, the tehsil headquarters of the region, in the Kullu district of Himachal Pradesh. The area is widely known as Outer Seraj. The college was established on June 17, 2006, as a result of sustained efforts by the local community under the leadership of the late octogenarian social worker, Mr. Hari Ram.

The campus spans approximately 23.6 bighas of land generously donated by local villagers, reflecting their collective commitment to advancing education and fostering socio-economic development in this remote area. Architecturally, the college building is thoughtfully designed to harmonize with the surrounding hilly landscape. The institution was relocated to its present campus in August 2012, where it continues to serve as a center of learning for the region.

The college is a co-educational institution affiliated with Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla. It initially introduced the Arts stream in the academic session 2006–07, followed by the Commerce stream in 2014–15 and the Science stream in 2016–17. Student enrollment has steadily increased over the years, attributable to the institution's sound infrastructure, high standards of teaching, and a supportive environment that promotes holistic development.

The college is equipped with modern infrastructure and comprehensive sports facilities, including a well-equipped gymnasium, boxing ring, kabaddi mat, and specialized mats for high jump, pole vault, and judo, along with badminton and table tennis facilities. The campus features spacious classrooms, well-maintained laboratories, multiple smart classrooms for technology-enabled teaching, a computer laboratory, and a conference hall equipped with a digital podium. It also houses a language laboratory equipped with ORELL software to support language learning, as well as a library with an extensive collection of print books and an e-library. The campus includes a well-maintained green playground, fostering an environment conducive to both academic and physical development.

Government Degree College Ani is still in its infancy; nevertheless, it has made significant strides in academics, cultural activities, and sports within a short span of time. During the academic session 2025–26, the college achieved notable distinctions in the Himachal Pradesh University Inter-College Competitions. In the Inter-College Youth Festival (Group II), the institution secured third position in the Classical Group Song category. Additionally, it attained third position in the One Act Play competition at the Inter-College Youth Festival (Group IV), first position in Folk Orchestra (Group II), and third position in Folk Dance (Group III), reflecting its commendable performance across diverse cultural events.

# Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes

## 1. Introduction

The National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 represents a transformative vision for India's higher education system, focusing on the holistic development of students to meet the requirements of the 21st century. At its core, the policy aims to move away from rigid academic structures toward a flexible, student-centric model that fosters creativity, critical thinking, and social consciousness. Some key changes introduced by the NEP 2020 includes:

- a) **Flexible Degree Duration:** Undergraduate degrees are structured as either 3-year or 4-year programs.
- b) **Multiple Entry and Exit Options:** Students can exit at various points with appropriate certifications (Certificate, Diploma, or Degree), allowing them to resume their studies later.
- c) **Academic Bank of Credits (ABC):** A digital platform facilitates the storage and transfer of earned credits, supporting seamless mobility between different institutions.
- d) **Multidisciplinary Approach:** Students have the opportunity to choose courses from diverse disciplines, moving beyond traditional academic silos to tailor their education to their interests.

## 2. HP-Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes

In alignment with national goals, and based on the UGC-CCFUGP notified in December 2022, the Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla (HPU) has developed a Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes (HPU-CCFUGP, hereafter HPU-UGP). The framework incorporates all essential aspects of the UGC-CCFUGP to facilitate the achievement of the policy visions stated in the NEP 2020.

## 3. UG Degree Programmes

The UGC-CCFUGP: 3.2.3 offers various undergraduate degree programmes for students to choose from. Under the new HP-CCFUGP framework, students can choose between a 3-year degree or a 4-year degree (Honours or Honours with Research).

- a) **3-Year UG Programme:** In the 3-Year UG Programme the students shall declare their Major and Minor, at the end of the second semester. The 3-year UG Programme shall have two-degree options:
  - i. **Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary:** For 3-year Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary UG programme, the credits for core courses will be distributed across various subjects of the disciplines (*see the programme structure ahead*).
  - ii. **Single Major:** In 3-year Single Core UG Programme a student must secure a minimum of 50 per cent credits in the major discipline.
- b) **4-year UG Programme:** Students who passed a 3-year multidisciplinary or interdisciplinary degree can choose to continue into a fourth year to earn an Honours degree, but only in a subject where they studied 6 DSC courses and 5 DSE courses during the first three years. Students who complete a 3-year undergraduate degree with a single major subject will continue the fourth year in the same major subject. The 4-year UG Programme shall have two-degree options:

- i. Honours:** Honours Degree can be pursued only in the subject in which student have completed 3-year UG degree with a single major or in the subject in which student have completed the 3-year UG degree with 6 DSC courses and 5 DSE courses.
- ii. Honours with Research:** A student who secures 75 percent or more marks in aggregate till semester 6 (up to a 3-year degree) shall be eligible for a 4-year degree Honours with Research, provided the college has HPU approval to offer the programme.

**Note:** College will decide whether to offer a 3-year or 4- year undergraduate programme before the academic session starts. However, the 4-Year Bachelor's Degree Programme may be considered a preferred option, as it would provide an opportunity to experience the full range of holistic and multidisciplinary education (vide UGC letter No. 27- 3/2023 (CU) dated 28<sup>th</sup> March 2023).

#### 4. The Programme Components

The entire 3-year/4-year UG programme curriculum is divided into two parts: (a) Core Courses and (b) Common Courses, which are described below.

- a) Core Courses:** These courses are designed to provide in-depth knowledge and specialization in a student's chosen field of study. All core courses have a credit allocation of 4.
  - iii. Discipline-Specific Course (DSC) / Major Courses:** These are the primary subjects of focus that allow for rigorous, in-depth study. For UG Degree in Single Major at least 50% of total credits shall be in that major subject (64 credits for a 3-year degree and 84 for a 4-year degree).
  - iv. Discipline-Specific Elective (DSE):** These are advanced courses within the major subject that offer further specialization. A 3-year single major program includes 5 DSE courses.
  - v. Minor Stream Courses (MC):** These courses are offered by a department to students majoring in other disciplines. They aim to provide a broader understanding and perspective beyond the primary major. A student must earn at least 24 credits in their minor over three years.
- b) Common Courses:** These courses are mandatory for all 3-year or 4-year undergraduate students, regardless of their major. Together, they account for 36 credits and are divided over 5 subdivisions.
  - vi. Multidisciplinary Courses (MDC):** These are introductory courses from broad disciplines other than the student's major or minor. Students take 9 credits of MDC and are encouraged to choose a different subject each semester.
  - vii. Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC):** Focused on language and communication skills, these 8-credit courses include English, Hindi, and Sanskrit.
  - viii. Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC):** These 9-credit courses focus on practical and vocational skill-building. Two of these (SEC-I and SEC-II) must be related to the student's core or minor disciplines.
  - ix. Value-Addition Courses (VAC):** These 6-credit courses focus on ethics and human values. Examples include Universal Human Values, which fosters self-awareness, and Understanding India, which covers constitutional obligations

and national development goals.

- x. **Internship/Apprenticeship/Project/Community Outreach (I/A/P/C):** This 4-credit component provides experiential learning by placing students in actual work situations, laboratories, or community service projects. These courses are common to all students and will be carried out during the winter and summer terms/vacations.

## 5 Duration of Award of UG Certificate, UG Diploma and Degree

Under the Himachal Pradesh University (HPU) Curriculum and Credit Framework, undergraduate programs are designed with a flexible duration of 3 or 4 years, allowing for multiple exit options with specific certifications based on the credits earned. The duration and requirements for each award are as follows:

- a) **UG Certificate:** Awarded after 1 year (2 semesters) of study upon securing 44 credits. This must include 4 credits from an Internship, Apprenticeship, Project, or Community Outreach (I/A/P/C) or work-based vocational courses completed during winter or summer terms.
- b) **UG Diploma:** Awarded after 2 years (4 semesters) of study upon securing 86 credits.
- c) **3-Year Bachelor's Degree:** Awarded after 3 years (6 semesters) of study upon successful completion of 128 credits.
- d) **4-Year Bachelor's Degree (Honours):** Awarded after 4 years (8 semesters) of study upon securing 168 credits.
- e) **4-Year Bachelor's Degree (Honours with Research):** Awarded after 4 years (8 semesters) upon securing 168 credits. This track requires a Research Project or Dissertation (12 credits) completed under the guidance of an eligible faculty member.

**Note:** 1) *While students can take breaks during their studies, the total time to complete any program cannot exceed 7 years.*

2) *Any certificate, diploma, or degree is only awarded if the student has successfully passed all the required courses up to that point.*

3) *A student who exits after 3 years with a Bachelor's Degree cannot re-enter the program for a fourth year later.*

## 6. Programme Structure

- a) **Semester:** A semester comprises 90 working days, and the academic calendar is divided into two semesters.
- b) **Credit Hours:** According to the Himachal Pradesh Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes, Credits are defined as the unit by which coursework is measured. It determines the number of hours of instruction required per week over the duration of a semester (minimum of 15 weeks). The system uses the following criteria for measuring credit hours:
  - i. **Credit Hour Definition:** A credit determines the number of hours of instruction required per week over a semester of at least 15 weeks.
  - ii. **Lecture Courses:** For one-hour lectures per week, each hour is counted as one credit. In a 15-week semester, a three-credit lecture course equals 45 teaching

hours.

- iii. **Tutorials:** One credit for tutorial work represents one hour of engagement per week.
- iv. **Practicum/Laboratory/Field Work:** One credit in these areas requires two hours of engagement per week. This also applies to seminars, internships, and community engagement.
- v. **Experiential Learning:** For activities like industrial or field visits, one credit equals three hours of engagement per week.
- vi. **Combined Credits:** A single course can combine different credit types. For example, a 4-credit course might consist of three 1-hour lectures (3 credits) and one 2-hour practicum (1 credit) per week.

A course can have a combination of lecture credits, tutorial credits, and practicum credits.

## 7. Semester Wise Programme Components:

During first and second Semester students will choose 3 discipline-specific (one stream) core courses (A, B, and C). Students opting for a Single Core Discipline (Major) have to select a Major and Minor out of the 3 subjects studied in the first and second semesters at the end of the second semester. Another discipline's DSC/course studied in the first two semesters will be treated as a minor. Additionally, these students will also take courses of their interest from Multidisciplinary, Ability Enhancement, Skill Enhancement, and Value-Addition categories. Students will also be placed in an internship/apprenticeship/field project, or community engagement and service program, as well as participate in field-based learning / minor projects.

During third and fourth semester, students will select courses of interest in their major and minor to build a career of interest. Students opting for the stream-based Multidisciplinary/ Interdisciplinary UG programme will have to declare one of the three subjects as a Minor in the third semester. The other two subjects will remain their Core (Major) subjects. All students will study the DSE of core courses, excluding the Minor.

**Note:** Students studying a Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary 3-year degree are strongly advised to choose one subject for all the DSEs in which they wish to do Honours or Honours with Research in fourth Year, as they must study at least 5 DSEs of that discipline in the second and third years. They will also pursue courses from multidisciplinary, ability enhancement, skill enhancement, and value-addition categories.

During fifth and sixth semester students will undertake higher-level courses and related courses to gain in-depth knowledge in the core courses, including DSEs (2 each) in the fifth and sixth semester, along with an ability enhancement course.

During the fourth and final year, students will undertake advanced-level courses to earn a 4-year undergraduate degree. Students opting for a Bachelor's Degree (Honours with Research) will undertake a Research Project or Dissertation. Students may be permitted to conduct a research project or dissertation in another department of the same institution or at another institution, provided the required facilities are available.

### 9. Academic Bank of Credits (ABC)

The HPU-UGP is directly connected to the Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) as notified by the UGC. All credits a student earns at the end of an examination in HPU-UGP will be deposited in the ABC by the university. As such, a student under HPU-UGP must register for the ABC as notified by the regulatory agencies.

### 10. Multiple Exits and Entries

The NEP 2020 offers students multiple entry and exit options in undergraduate programs, providing flexibility to accommodate various learning paces and life circumstances. As permitted under the UGC Guidelines for Multiple Entry and Exit in Academic Programmes offered in Higher Education Institutions, students will be allowed to enter/re-enter in the odd semesters and after even semesters, provided they fulfil the minimum requirements for entry and exit.

**Entry Points:** Students can enter the undergraduate program at the beginning of any academic year.

**Exit Points and Corresponding Qualifications:**

- 1) After 1 year: Undergraduate Certificate
- 2) After 2 years: Undergraduate Diploma
- 3) After 3 years: Bachelor's Degree
- 4) After 4 years: Bachelor's Degree with Honours or Bachelor's Degree with Honours with Research

**Re-entry:** Students who exit at any point have the option to re-enter the course within three years; however, they must complete their degree within a maximum of seven years from the original date of admission.

11. The NAD Cell of HPU will evaluate the multiple entry and exit points to determine the eligibility of students who desire to join the University from other HEIs with lateral entry.

12. Examination and Grading

The examination and grading modalities of the HPU Undergraduate Programme (HPU-UGP) will be governed by the Himachal Pradesh University's official Examination and Grading Ordinance/Notifications. The assessment and evaluation system is structured according to the credit value of each course. The 4-credit courses, including Discipline Specific Core (DSC), Discipline Specific Elective (DSE), and Minor Courses (MC), along with 3-credit courses such as Multidisciplinary Courses (MDC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC), and 2-credit courses like Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC), Value Added Courses (VAC), and Add-on Courses (AOC), are evaluated through a two-part system. These two components are:

- a) **Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA):** The CCA component assesses students throughout the semester through class tests, assignments, presentations, attendance, and other academic activities.
- b) **End Semester Examination (ESE):** The End Semester Examination evaluates students' understanding and performance at the conclusion of the semester through a formal written examination.

### 14. Pass Marks

Pass marks for each subject: 40% aggregate and minimum 35% in each individual component (term end exams, Practical, IA, etc.) of a subject.

### 15. Promotion

Students shall be allowed to proceed from one semester/year to the next in accordance with HPU's Examination and Grading Ordinance/Notifications. However, for a student to progress to the fourth year of the undergraduate programme, they must clear all the courses from the previous three years.

### 16. Repeating or Options for Other Courses

- a) If a student fails a particular course, they shall be promoted to the next semester/year as per guidelines for Examinations and Grading under NEP 2020.
- b) Repetition of course (s) shall be only for the end-of-semester examinations.
- c) In place of the failed courses, students may opt for the following in consultation with the parent department:
  - i) Choose other courses with the same credits offered through CDOE.
  - ii) Choose online/CDOE courses approved by HPU as per existing UGC regulations, having the same credits.

### 17. Eligibility Condition

In addition to the one already in the prospectus

- i. A student who has passed 12th standard or equivalent examination in any stream from a recognised institution (UGC-CCFUGP: 3.2.3).
- ii. Admission to the 3-year/4-year UG programme will be based on the preference of the Major, if any. In case a student does not want to opt for any major in the 3-year programmes/they will be admitted based on their preferences for subject combinations.

- iii. Admission to a discipline-specific course or major will be subject to the availability of the subject and the capacity of the college/department/centre.
- iv. No student shall be eligible for admission to a Programme in any discipline unless s/he fulfils the prerequisites of courses as fixed by the university.

## Significant Notes on Curriculum and Credit Framework for UG Programmes (CCFUGP)

1. The prescribed credit weightage includes Lecture, Tutorial, and Practical components.
2. In the first semester, students will be offered three different subjects within the same stream: A, B, and C (Core and Minor are provided here for illustrative purposes only).
3. At the end of the second semester, each student may choose one of two programmes: the Multi-Disciplinary/Interdisciplinary or Single Core Discipline (Major) programme. The student choosing the latter will be required to give his/her Major and Minor at the end of the second semester. Such choices, including DSCs made at the end of the second semester, shall remain in effect until the VI semester.
4. Additional Seats: The Colleges may create 10% extra seats over and above the sanctioned strength to accommodate the request for a change of major. Any unfilled or vacant seats may be filled with those seeking a change of Major. Preference will be given to those with the highest CGPA and no arrears in the first year/semester.
5. The DSCs of another discipline for the first two semesters of students who opt for Major programmes will be treated as Minors.
6. A DSC offered in one discipline will be treated as a Minor by another. Students can choose Minor Courses from two different subjects, but must earn a minimum of 12 credits in each.
7. MDCs must be selected from a broad discipline/pool of MDCs other than Major and Minor subjects.
8. AEC/VAC/SEC-3 should be chosen from a pool of courses. Every discipline shall provide these courses, some of which will be offered discipline-specific, while the rest can be open to students of all other disciplines. However, the two SECs (SEC-1 & SEC-2) must be chosen from the discipline-specific (Core and Minor).
9. A maximum of two language courses can be opted for as Core and Minor. AECs should be in a language other than what is studied in DSCs/Minors.
10. I/A/P/C will be determined at the end of the first semester to enable students to carry out some I/A/P/C activities during winter vacation.
11. To pursue an Honour degree in the 4th year, students will have to choose only one discipline in both semesters, in which s/he has studied 6 DSCs and 5 DSEs in the first three years.
12. A student who secures 75% or more marks in aggregate till semester 6 (up to a 3-year degree) shall be eligible for a 4-year degree Honours with Research, provided HPU has approved the college to offer it.
13. One course per semester (DSC/Minor/MDC/SEC/etc.) from a subject offered in two (or more) different programs (e.g. BCA and BSc/ BPA and BA/ BFA and BA/ Shastri and BA/etc) must be the same.

14. Students in the BA programmes can opt for only one DSC each from the Bachelor of Performing Arts (Dance, Music, Vocal & Instrument/Tabla/ etc.) and the Bachelor of Fine Arts (Painting/Applied Arts/Sculpture/ etc.).

15. Major and Minor shall be awarded on fulfilment of the following conditions: For Major, 64 credits in a 3-year & 84 credits in a 4-year UG programme in a single Major Discipline. For Minor 28 credits in 4-year UG programme in a single Minor Discipline

16. The Dissertation and Project will start in the VII semester. However, the evaluation and assessment will be conducted in both the VII and VIII semesters.

***\*As this scheme is being introduced for the first time, it is subject to modifications. Any changes applied in subsequent years after admission to the 1st Year will be retrospectively applicable.***

### **SUBJECT COMBINATIONS FOR BA/BCom/BSc FIRST YEAR STUDENTS UNDER CCFUG FROM 2026-27**

In the first semester, students will be offered three different subjects within the same stream: A, B, and C (Core and Minor are provided in the table above for illustrative purposes only).

At the end of the second semester, each student may choose one of two programmes: the Multi-Disciplinary/Interdisciplinary or Single Core Discipline (Major) programme. The student choosing the latter will be required to give his/her Major and Minor at the end of the second semester. Such choices, including DSCs made at the end of the second semester, shall remain in effect until the VI semester.

Subject allocation in the Arts stream shall be conducted strictly on the basis of merit. Students are advised to exercise due care while selecting their subject combinations.

### ADMISSION PROCESS FOR FIRST YEAR

1. Candidates seeking admission to the first year must apply using the prescribed online form available at <http://www.gcanni.edu.in>.
2. After submitting the form, candidates must pay the prospectus fee online using credit/debit cards, UPI (BHIM, Google Pay, PhonePe, Paytm), or mobile/internet banking.
3. Candidates may contact the College Guidance and Counselling Committee during college hours for assistance with the application process.
4. Merit lists will be published as per the schedule in the prospectus.
5. After counselling, applicants must pay the admission fee online using the available payment methods.

### DOCUMENTS REQUIRED TO BE UPLOADED WITH THE APPLICATION FORM

1. Matriculation certificate for verification of date of birth.
2. 10+2 mark sheet.
3. H.P. domicile certificate for girl students (for tuition fee exemption).
4. Disability certificate (minimum 40%) and category certificate, if applying under these categories.

5. Original character certificate from the Head of the last institution attended. For private candidates, the certificate must be issued by a Gazetted Officer and should not be older than six months from the date of application submission.
6. For admission under the “Single Girl Child” category, an affidavit from the parents declaring the same.
7. Candidates from boards/universities other than H.P. must upload a copy of the migration certificate and submit the original at the time of counselling.
8. Affidavits must be provided wherever applicable.
9. SC/ST certificate issued by a First-Class Magistrate (authorized signatory), if seeking relaxation in age or marks.
10. Any recent gap in the applicant’s academic record must be supported by documentary evidence or an affidavit explaining the activities during that period.

### **ADMISSION TO BA/BSC/BCOM II & III 2026-27 (UNDER CBCS)**

Admission to 2nd Year & 3rd year will be on roll-on basis and will remain provisional till the declaration of the result of previous class or till further directions from H.P. Govt./H.P. University.

***Note 1:** A candidate failing in either one or two subjects/papers will be given compartment in that subject/papers and will be eligible for promotion to the next class. He/she will appear in the subject/paper in which he/she got the compartment. He/she will have two chances (one at the supplementary stage and one at the annual stage), available to clear his/her compartment in subjects/papers. He/she will not be awarded the degree until he/she clears all his/her courses within five years from the date of his/her admission to a particular course. A candidate failing in three or more subjects/papers will be treated as fail in that year and has to repeat the entire year.*

***Note 2:** As per norms and regulations of the University 7 10(c) there shall be minor examinations after completion of approximately 2/3 of the syllabus. Awards and copies of the above test have to be shown to students and the result has to be displayed on the notice board of the department/college. Students who do not qualify in IA/CCA can be given chance by the College for minor test and submission of assignments etc. As the University has given 1st and 2nd level verification to the college/ teacher concerned and Principal respectively, therefore, it shall be responsibility of the college to upload and verify the correct award. No correction/rectification shall be allowed once the awards have been verified by the Principal. Further, it is clarified that students shall be eligible to get the admit card if he/she has qualified in CCA/IA i.e., 35% minimum, but he/she shall have to score 40% and 45% aggregate Marks in annual system and semester system as the case may be (Final theory exams and CCA). If a candidate fails to score 40%/45% Marks in aggregate he/she only has the option to appear in theory examination and*

*CCA once uploaded and verified by the College shall not be subject to any change or improvement.*

## **CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM (CBCS)**

*(Note: Applicable for BA/BSc/BCom II and III Year for academic session 2026-27 only)*

The CBCS provides an opportunity for the students to choose courses from the prescribed courses comprising core, elective/minor or skill-based courses. The courses can be evaluated following the grading system, which is considered to be better than the conventional marks system. Therefore, it is necessary to introduce uniform grading system in the entire higher education in India. This will benefit the students to move across institutions within India to begin with and across countries. The uniform grading system will also enable potential employers in assessing the performance of the candidates. In order to bring uniformity in evaluation system and computation of the Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) based on student's performance in examinations, the UGC has formulated the guidelines to be followed.

### **Outline of Choice Based Credit System:**

**1. Core Course:** A course, which should compulsorily be studied by a candidate as a core requirement is termed as a Core course.

**2. Elective Course:** Generally, a course which can be chosen from a pool of courses and which may be very specific or specialized or advanced or supportive to the discipline/ subject of study or which provides an extended scope or which enables an exposure to some other discipline/subject/domain or nurtures the candidate's proficiency/skill is called an Elective Course.

**2.1 Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) Course:** Elective courses may be offered by the main discipline/subject of study is referred to as Discipline Specific Elective. The University/Institute may also offer discipline related Elective courses of interdisciplinary nature (to be offered by main discipline/subject of study).

**2.2 Generic Elective (GE) Course:** An elective course chosen generally from an unrelated discipline/subject, with an intention to seek exposure is called a Generic Elective.

**P.S.:** A core course offered in a discipline/subject may be treated as an elective by other discipline/subject and vice versa and such electives may also be referred to as Generic Elective.

**3. Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC)/Skill Development Courses:** The Ability Enhancement (AE) Courses may be of two kinds: AE Compulsory Course (AECC) and AE Elective Course (AEEC). "AECC" courses are the courses based upon the content that leads to Knowledge enhancement. They ((i) Environmental Science, (ii) English/MIL Communication)

are mandatory for all disciplines. AECC courses are value-based and/or skill-based and are aimed at providing hands-on-training, competencies, skills, etc.

**3.1 Ability Enhancement Compulsory Course (AECC):** Environmental Science, English Communication/MIL Communication.

**3.2 Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC):** These courses may be chosen from a pool of courses designed to provide value-based and/or skill-based instruction.

All Courses (Core and Elective) will have an evaluation system that comprises of the following two components:

1. **Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA)** accounting for 30% (for Arts and Commerce) & 30% (for science) of the final grade that a student gets in a course, and
2. **End-Semester Examination (ESE)** accounting for the remaining 70% (Arts/Commerce) & 50%Theory + 20% Practical (Science) of the final grade that the student gets in a course.

**Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA)** consists of:

- (a) **Mid Term (Minor) Test:** There will be one Mid Term Test, to be conducted when approximately two-third of the syllabus has been covered.
- (b) **Seminar / Assignment / Term Paper**
- (c) **Classroom Attendance** – Each student will have to attend a minimum of 75% Lectures/Tutorials/Practicals. A student having less than 75% attendance will not be allowed to appear in the End-Semester Examination (ESE). A 5% assessment will be given on the basis of this attendance.

## GENERAL ADMISSION RULES

### ELIGIBILITY

A candidate will be eligible for admission to B.A./B.Com./B.Sc. 1<sup>st</sup> year, if he/ she has passed senior secondary (+2) examination (Academic Stream) conducted by the HP Board of School Education or an examination accepted as equivalent thereto by the various bodies of HP University.

- (i) Provided that the candidate who has passed the qualifying examination with commerce stream shall be given preference in admission to B.Com.
- (ii) Provided that the candidate who has passed the qualifying examination with science stream shall be given preference in admission to B.Sc.

### MINIMUM PERCENTAGE OF MARKS REQUIRED

1. A candidate seeking admission to B.A. 1<sup>st</sup> year shall have passed senior secondary (+2) examination or an examination equivalent thereto of a Board/University established by law in India with pass in four written subjects (including English) with **33% marks**. Provided that a candidate seeking admission to B.A. 1<sup>st</sup> year with Mathematics as one of the subjects of study should have obtained either **45% marks** in aggregate or **45 marks** in mathematics at +2 level. (5% marks relaxation for SC/ST students.)
2. A candidate seeking admission to B.Sc. 1<sup>st</sup> year shall have passed senior secondary (+2) under 10+2 examination or an examination equivalent thereto of a Board/ University established by law in India with pass in four written subjects (three Science elective subjects & one English) with **45% marks**.
3. A candidate seeking admission to BCom 1<sup>st</sup> year shall have passed senior secondary (+2) examination under 10+2 Commerce or an examination equivalent thereto of a Board/University established by law in India with pass in four written subjects (including English) with **45% marks** or **40%** for those who have passed +2 examination under Commerce Group.

Note:

1. An applicant failing in all subjects or having a compartment in 10+2 will not be admitted.
2. For SC/ST candidates, relaxation of 5% marks in aggregate is given for admission in commerce and science but minimum 45% marks are required to get admission in Science and Commerce.

## AGE LIMIT

An applicant applying for the first year of degree course must not be more than 23 years of age (25 years for girl student only) on **01-07-2026**. The upper age limit is raised to 26 years for SC/ST applicants. However, the Vice Chancellor, H.P. University shall have the power to permit age relaxation for reason to be recorded in writing up to a maximum of six months.

All such cases may be provisionally granted age relaxation up to six months by the principal of the college and a consolidated list of all such cases will be sent for approval of the Vice Chancellor by 31st October of every academic year.

## RESERVATION OF SEATS (ORDINANCE 3.14)

Our institution follows the reservation policy of H.P. Government and H.P. University in admissions. The following reservations are available, which are filled according to the reservation roster devised by H.P. University:

These reservations will be applicable to those, who have passed their qualifying examination from H.P. Board of School Education or from any other Schools located within territorial Jurisdiction of Himachal Pradesh or bonafide resident of Himachal PradeMr. Sports and cultural seats will be allotted to those events which are recognized by HPU sports and co-curricular council. The final decision under sports and cultural quota will be with the respective committees constituted for the same.

### **REFUSAL OF ADMISSION**

1. Notwithstanding anything contained in the rules; a student shall be refused admission if his/her conduct during any previous stay in the college has been found unsatisfactory.
2. A student who has been expelled or rusticated shall not be admitted to any course of study in the college.

*Note: Admission is not a matter of right. It can be terminated at any time during the session if the conduct of student is not found satisfactory.*

### **PROVISIONAL ADMISSION**

The admission of a student migrating from another University shall only be treated as provisional and shall only be confirmed when he/she produces the migration certificate and a certificate of good conduct from the head of the institution last attended by him/her. Provided, however, that the student disqualified by any other University shall not be given admission during the period of disqualification.

### **CONDUCT PROBATION**

In case the student's stay in previous session/ during the current session is found unsatisfactory his/her admission shall be put on conduct probation for one month and after review of his/her conduct during that period admission shall be regularized / discontinued by the administration.

### **MIGRATION RULES**

1. Migration from other college to Govt. Degree College, Ani at Haripur, District Kullu and vice-versa is governed by HPU rules.
2. No migration certificate can be issued unless the student is registered with university. A migrating student will not be admitted to the college if the subject/ courses studied by him/her previously are not available in the college.
3. The migrating student must submit the following documents/information:
  - (i) Lecture attendance statement (of all subjects offered)

- (ii) Statement of credits earned by the students under CCA
  - (iii) Character certificate from the Principal of the college last attended.
4. After migration has been sanctioned and notified by the HPU, the student must join the second college within the time period stipulated by the HPU.
  5. The college first joined is entitled to the tuition fee for the month in which the university sanctions the migration. The second college is not entitled to the tuition fee for the month or part thereof.
  6. The admission of the students migrating from another university or from an affiliated college or institution in the same course (including ICDEOL) shall be governed by the regulations framed by the Executive Council of HPU from time to time.
  7. The admission of the student migrating from another university shall be treated as provisional and shall be confirmed when he/she produces the migration certificate issued by the University and a certificate of good conduct issued by the Head of the Institution last attended.
  8. A student disqualified by another university shall not be given admission during the period of the disqualification.

### LEAVE RULES FOR STUDENTS

- ❖ It is compulsory for all the students to get their leave sanctioned before proceeding on any kind of leave.
- ❖ A student can proceed on leave with prior permission from the Principal, but the application should also be signed by the parents/guardian of the student and duly recommended by the tutor.
- ❖ A tutor can recommend leave up-to 3 days. For longer duration, a student should get leave application signed by the principal.
- ❖ Leave during House Examination will be sanctioned by the Principal on the recommendation of the senior tutor in special cases only.
- ❖ If a student remains absent continuously for more than 10 days without authorized leave, his/her name will be struck off from the rolls of the college. Such student will have to seek re-admission by submitting an application giving the reason to the Principal with recommendation of the teacher concerned and on payment of the prescribed fee.
- ❖ Leave on account of illness must be accompanied by a Medical Certificate.

### RE-ADMISSION

Students can seek re-admission twice during the session. First re-admission will be allowed within ten days after the name is struck off after paying a fine of Rs. 100/- and a fine of Rs. 200/- will be charged for the second re-admission within ten days after the name is struck off from the rolls. No student will be allowed to seek admission after two times of re-admission.

- Students are required to register and complete the online admission form for the academic session 2026-27 through the college admission portal available on the official website: [www.gcanni.edu.in](http://www.gcanni.edu.in).
- All students must also complete the Anti-Ragging Affidavit form available at [https://antiragging.in/Site/Affidavits\\_Registration.aspx](https://antiragging.in/Site/Affidavits_Registration.aspx). This is mandatory for every student. A printed copy of the completed affidavit must be submitted to the college office along with the hard copy of the admission form.
- Students are advised to check their names in the subject-wise merit list published on the college website or displayed on the college notice board.
- After receiving approval for admission from the Principal, students must proceed to pay the admission fee through the online payment system available on the college website.
- Students are required to have the admission fee amount verified by the fee clerk prior to making the online payment.
- After successful payment, students must submit a copy of the fee receipt to the college office, either in person or via post.

## SCHOLARSHIP

Scholarships are awarded by both the State and Central Governments, and the college facilitates their dissemination and implementation in accordance with the rules and guidelines issued by the State Government from time to time. These scholarships are granted to deserving students across various categories, including meritorious students, IRDP beneficiaries, Scheduled Castes (SC), Scheduled Tribes (ST), Other Backward Classes (OBC), physically challenged students, and those from economically weaker sections.

Students may apply for a wide range of scholarships, broadly categorized into State-sponsored, Central-sponsored, and technical scholarship schemes. ## LIBRARY

To cultivate the habit of reading among students, various magazines, newspapers, and employment-related newspapers are subscribed to on a monthly basis. In order to meet students' needs, the library is equipped with a photocopying machine, adequate furniture, and an air-conditioned e-library facility. The library has also been computerized, with systematic cataloguing of books and the adoption of advanced library management software such as INFLIBNET, thereby enhancing accessibility and convenience for students.

### Library Rules:

- ❑ After admission, students are required to collect their Library-cum-Identity Card upon submission of the fee receipt. The card must be carefully preserved.
- ❑ Normally, two books are issued for a period of 15 days; however, the librarian reserves the right to recall any book at any time.
- ❑ Books must be returned by the due date; otherwise, a fine of ₹1 per book per day will be charged for the overdue period.
- ❑ Books are issued only on presentation of a valid Library-cum-Identity Card.
- ❑ Reference books, periodicals, journals, and magazines are not issued for home use. These may be consulted within the library premises only.
- ❑ Students are responsible for all books issued to them. Any damaged, torn, or defaced books will not be accepted. In case of loss, the student must either replace the book or pay its current price, subject to the approval of the principal.
- ❑ In case of loss of the library-cum-Identity Card, a duplicate card may be issued on submission of an application to the principal, payment of ₹20, and production of a copy of the FIR lodged with the police.
- ❑ Library security must be claimed within one year of leaving the college; otherwise, it will be forfeited.

## CO-CURRICULAR / EXTENSION ACTIVITIES

Co-curricular activities play a crucial role in complementing classroom instruction, which often focuses primarily on imparting theoretical knowledge aligned with examination requirements. However, without engagement in additional activities, students may not develop the broader range of skills necessary for their holistic development. In this context, co-curricular engagements become essential, as they, together with classroom learning, contribute to the integrated development of the body, mind, and spirit of the individual.

With these objectives in view, the college has established various clubs and subject-specific societies under the guidance of dedicated faculty members. Students are encouraged to actively participate in at least one club and relevant subject society in order to enrich their educational experience and emerge as well-rounded graduates upon completion of their studies.

In today's dynamic and competitive environment, reliance solely on theoretical knowledge is insufficient. Graduates are expected to possess a diverse set of competencies, and those lacking such breadth of skills may find it challenging to meet the expectations of modern professional and societal contexts.

### NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME

The NSS is a very important part of the activities of an educational institution which helps in developing the spirit of service among the students. The college has been allotted two units (100 volunteers per unit) of NSS by HP University. The new students shall be enrolled as NSS volunteers to take up regular as well as special camp activities in and around the College under NSS Programme Officer as envisaged under the spirit of the scheme in the beginning of the session. The enrolment is made by selection keeping in view the interest of the student in social service. The NSS volunteers attend one day camp, 7-Day Annual Camp, conduct village surveys and are involved in other college activities and functions and thus get great opportunities for their development and training.

### THE BHARAT SCOUTS AND GUIDES

The Bharat Scouts and Guides is a voluntary organization. It is devoted to the development of character of the young generation and selfless service to the country. The college has rovers and rangers unit for boys and girls of age group 17 to 25. One group consists of 24 Rovers and 24 Rangers. The Rovers and Rangers are sent to attend the training camps from time to time and are engaged in various college activities and functions resulting into great learning to them.

### NATIONAL CADET CORPS (NCC)

National Cadet Corps is a voluntary training Program and any willing student can join it. It is a Tri-services /Organization engaged in grooming the youth of India to become patriotic citizens. Govt. Degree College, Ani had established NCC Unit in 2020 with an aim to encourage the feeling of patriotism and integrity, to groom students into models of discipline and develops in them moral character, leadership, personality and spirit of selfless service. - ❖ The appeal will be placed before the Grievance Redressal committee (GRC), Chaired by the college Principal for cases pertaining the core/elective/generic courses.

- ❖ Any other type of grievance may be heard by the said committee.

## CODE OF CONDUCT AND DISCIPLINE

1. Every student should carry his/her Identity Card, which is issued to the students after the admission. It should be shown /produced on demand. The loss of the card should be reported through FIR immediately.
2. Any act of ragging on the campus will be severely dealt with. Ragging implies harassment, physical or mental torture to another student by a student or group of students.
3. The Principal and the members of the staff have the power to take disciplinary action against students indulging in act of indiscipline, which may lead to imposing fine, or suspension, rustication or expulsion of the guilty student. Following acts will be construed as acts of misconduct and indiscipline and punished with either fine or suspension/expulsion or both:

  - Loitering aimlessly in the verandas/ corridors, making noise or trying to disturb classes.
  - Smoking, taking drugs/alcohol and chewing tobacco, spitting etc. in the college campus.
  - Bringing outsiders/miscreants/anti- social elements in the campus.
  - Pasting posters on the walls or notice on the Notice Board without prior permission of the Principal.
  - Misbehaving with teachers/other staff.
  - Holding of any meeting on the campus without prior permission.
  - Using mobile phones in the class rooms.
  - Indulging in any rash/ unbecoming behavior
  - Damage of any kind to college property including defacement of walls, damage to furniture, etc.
4. Parents/Guardians are requested to remain in touch with the Principal and the teachers regarding the progress of their wards.

## **ZERO TOLERANCE TO RAGGING**

The students are informed that under the orders of the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India as well as Hon'ble High Court of Himachal Pradesh and The Himachal Pradesh University Notification o. 1-14/HPU/DSW/08-/360 Dated 10th July, 2008, Ragging in Educational Institutions including Hostels is strictly banned. Any student found guilty of ragging will be imprisoned for a term which may extend for the three years or fine which may extend to Rs 50,000/- or both.

### Himachal Pradesh Education Institute (Prohibition of Ragging) ACT 2009

- No student shall indulge in ragging in any form, within or outside the premises of an educational institution
- Any person if on prima facie evidence is found guilty will be suspended from the educational institution
- On Conviction, be punished with imprisonment for term which may extend to 3 years or with fine which may extend to fifty thousand or with both
- Will be expelled from the College/Institution
- Expelled student will not be admitted in any other Institution for a period of three years from the date of order of such expulsion
